Awarding of locket type medal – hinged and made of hallmarked Pewter, engraved picture of cricketer on the front and inscription on the reverse.

The inscription reads "Presented by W. Williams to F.T.G.C.C. Won by F.J. Charman season 1884-5". It was found by Mr Ron Radford in the back yard of his property at 11 Cullis Parade, Bayswater.

The medal was donated to the Knox Historical Society in the 1980's but has since either been misplaced or misappropriated and without a Photograph being taken no knowledge of the medallion other than the Catalogue note above exists at the Society (Last checked 2008).

21/8/1884 DA Once more the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB comes forth from its shell and held a preliminary meeting last week with the following results: Patron S. Renwick Esq., President Cr. J.T. Dobson, Vice Presidents A.J. Porter and P.J. McQuade, Secretary F.J. Charman. A large number were enrolled as members and after some routine business the meeting closed.

11/9/1884 DA The draw of the DANDENONG CRICKET CLUB includes games against the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB on 4/10/1884 at the Gully and 14/2/1885 at Dandenong.

For the past week or two strictly speaking doings in this district have been trifling and had it not been for the cricket news and rifle club talk your representative would fail in finding notes, wherewith to follow the usual correspondence of Ferntree Gully.... The youth also puts on a pleasing countenance; their craniums this year overflowing with cricket, and to the passer-by the one and only topic he hears is cricket, their victories are already totted up, their defeats are nil and consequently we must arrive at the conclusion that the members of the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB are exceedingly warm in form and woe to the opposing that visit us.

The first match of the season occurs against LYSTERFIELD next Saturday week (13/9/1884), who I consider they will beat.

18/9/1884 DA A team from FERNTREE GULLY journeyed to Lysterfield on Saturday last (13/9/1884), where they were very hospitably treated by Mr. Andrew Smith prior to commencing the opening match of the season. The match, after a pleasant game resulted in a win for FERNTREE GULLY. Charman and Williams played brilliantly for the winners while Stevens and Williams performed best with the ball. A. Smith and Dawson batted well for the losers. **Refer Scorebook**.

A meeting of the FERNTREE GULLY cricketers was held on Wednesday last at the Huntingtower Hotel when a large number was present. Councillor Dobson, the President of the club occupied the chair... W. Williams was elected Captain and P.J. McQuade his Vice Captain while the latter was awarded the Batting Average and a superb trophy, donated by Thomas Jones, for the best Bowling Average having bowled more than 50 overs...

1/10/1884 SBMJ The DANDENONG CRICKET CLUB journey to Ferntree Gully on Saturday next (4/10/1884), when a close contest is expected. The play will be on the ground of the latter.

2/10/1884 DA The following will represent FERNTREE GULLY on Saturday (4/10/1884) against DANDENONG - P.J. McQuade (Capt.), Stevens, Dawson, Smith, W. Williams, H. Williams, T. Williams, O. Williams, Richards, Dobson and Charman with emergencies H. Monk, A. Smith, Westley and Jones.

A meeting of FERNTREE GULLY cricketers was held last week. In the absence of the President Mr. Minns occupied the chair. It was resolved that during the coming season the playground should be on Mr. Grimwood's property and that in future all meetings connected with the club should be held at the school house. In fact, a general turnover of the club has been made, which it is hoped will be for the best

9/10/1884 DA The following will represent FERNTREE GULLY against RINGWOOD next Saturday (11/10/1884) – Stevens, Charman, H., T. and W. Williams, Dawson, Smith, A. Smith, D. Dobson, Westley and Pickett, with emergencies E. Dobson, Atherton and Carey.

30/10/1884 DA A match was played at Ferntree Gully on Saturday (25/10/1884) between the local team and RINGWOOD and was won by the locals. **Refer Scorebook**.

31/10/1884 HAWB RINGWOOD vs FERNTREE GULLY; On Saturday last (25/10/1884). The RINGWOOD team were rather unfortunate scoring only 17 runs which were contributed by the following – Pratt 6, Peters 4, H. Pratt 2, Jones 1 and Rice 1. Golding, Fahy, Monckton and Cowley were disposed of for nil and three Byes made the total 17. The FERNTREE GULLY team succeeded in putting together 55 before time was called. **Refer Scorebook.**

3/1/1885 FITZ On Saturday last (27/12/1884) the NORTH FITZROY went to Ferntree Gully to play the local club and were treated very badly, no luncheon or anything to eat or drink in any shape being provided, with the exception of a bucket of water which you could lift up and drink from, no pannikin, cup, or anything to use was to be got. I may state that we left Fitzroy at 6 o'clock in the morning, and the least the FTG CLUB could have done, would have been to provide a few sandwiches or something.

We have played as many up country matches as any junior club, but never met with such a miserable lot as the above club, and I hope this will act as a warning to any club that may desire to play them. Now for the match; we went in first on a matting wicket which played horribly, the ground underneath being in a very bumpy state and several of our players got some hard knocks, but however, we made 105, Drysdale 27 not out, Kernel 21 and McDonough 17 batting well.

Then the GULLY boys had a try and made 51; Marshall, Hayes and Drysdale's bowling being too good. We, in our second try made 100 for the loss of four wickets, Delaney 41, McDonough 17 and Marshall 19 (not out), all batted well. FITZROY 105 (Drysdale 27*, Kernel 21, McDonough 17) & 4/100 (Delaney 41, Marshall 19*, McDonough 17) def FERNTREE GULLY 51 with Marshall, Hayes & Drysdale being too good with the ball

11/4/1885 STKT A TRIP TO FERNTREE GULLY WITH THE SOUTHERN CROSS CRICKET CLUB; BY A MEMBER. The annual holiday excursion of the above club was held on Good Friday (10/4/1885), the place selected this season being Ferntree Gully. Punctuality was the order of the day and at seven o'clock twenty members was at the Town Hall patiently awaiting the arrival of a well-known player who had not put in an appearance.

The missing one, thanks to the kindness of two of his comrades, was soon at the starting point, and, after some, good-tempered chaff was indulged in at his expense, "all aboard" was given, and we were on our way to the Gully, the drive being enlivened by the never-flagging harmony of the occupants. At Wheeler's Hill a short stoppage was made to give the horses a drink and revive the parched throats of the members for the rest of the journey.

We were soon on our way again, and, after a very pleasant drive, the Gully was reached at about eleven o'clock. As the cricket match did not commence until one o'clock, our worthy friend, W. Davies, who certainly must be a firm believer in the healthful exercise of walking, proposed that we should go to the top, and all innocently started on what proved to be a hard undertaking, but spurred on by their leader, who in variably told them it was only a little way further, they struggled on until they reached the summit.

About halfway up a few members cried "content," Edwards, Mauger, and Gleeson being amongst them; but not to be outdone by the other, they renewed their walk and arrived at their destination, tired and weary-looking; one of their number dragging a porcupine after him, which he gallantly captured coming along the track. We were soon at the residence of Mrs. Murphy, and our kind hostess regaled us with milk, &c., which was very acceptable after our tramp. After a short spell we bid good-bye to Mrs. Murphy and commenced to return along the back of the ranges, which was found to be more easy than coming up, Mauger finding it very easy indeed, as he came full speed into one of the largest trees and found that it could resist all his strength.

We were soon at Grimwood's Hotel, and after replenishing the inner man, a start was made for the cricket ground to commence the match. We found it rather difficult to raise a team, owing to the majority not having recovered from the morning's walk, and preferring to do duty as barrackers. W. Williams, the local captain, having won the toss from our skipper, W. Lockett, sent us into the field, and we were treated to a little more exercise, and our opponents did not allow us to leave the field until they had made 238 runs. The bowling and fielding of "ours" was of the poorest description, and some of the fieldsmen adopted the most novel positions, such as lying down, &c. Cairns fielded like a Trojan, taking off his boots to enable him to go faster, and as he appeared in a running humour, his companions good naturedly allowed him full advantage to display his prowess. Plummer bowled well and secured most of the wickets.

Owing to darkness setting in we were not permitted to bat long, but quite enough to have five wickets levelled for 46 runs; but this may be accounted for by the bad light, which made it very dangerous to bat. After the match both teams adjourned to Grimwood's Hotel, and sat down to an excellent repast, provided by the FERNTREE GULLY CLUB, which was done full justice to by us, our appetites being sharpened by our afternoon's leather hunting. At the conclusion of the dinner Mr. Davies, in a few well-chosen words, thanked the FERNTREE GULLY CLUB for their kindness, and invited them to meet us at Prahran on some future occasion.

Mr. Grimwood responded for the Gully and trusted we would pay them another visit. Afterwards, a few pleasant hours were spent in harmony, and at 8 30, after thanking Mr. Grimwood for his kind and hospitable treatment, a start was made for home, three cheers being given by the FERNTREE GULLY, and responded to by us. The return trip was accomplished rather quickly, and at 11.30 the Town Hall was reached, all the members being tired out, but highly pleased with their day's outing. To Messrs W. Davies and Dan Gleeson, the success of the trip was due, and the kind treatment received from, the Ferntree Gully people will long be remembered by the SOUTHERN CROSS CRICKET CLUB.

15/4/1885 SBMJ A cricket match was played here on Saturday (11/4/1885) between the FERNTREE GULLY and the SOUTHERN CROSS CLUBS, which ended in a draw greatly in favor of the GULLY. When time was called the scores stood FERNTREE GULLY 257: SOUTHERN CROSS five wickets down for 30 runs. Article on replacement of Huntingtower Hotel with Club Hotel.

NOTE: From Knox Historical Society (KHS) Archives: Awarding of locket type (Fob) medallion – hinged and made of hallmarked Pewter, engraved picture of cricketer on the front and inscription on the reverse. The inscription reads "Presented by W. Williams to F.T.G.C.C. Won by F.J. Charman season 1884-5". It was found by Mr Ron Radford in the back yard of his property at 11 Cullis Parade, Bayswater.

The medal was donated to the KHS in the 1980's but has since either been misplaced or misappropriated and without a Photograph being taken, no knowledge of the medallion other than the Catalogue note exists.
