9/9/1891 **DEXP** Report on the AGM and election of Office Bearers of the Ferntree Gully Rifle Club held on Tuesday 1st September.

The **Annual General Meeting** of the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB was held on Saturday evening, the 5th inst at Mrs. Blair's Hotel. There was a good muster of members, and the following were elected for the ensuing season. **Captain: E. Blazey, Vice Captain: F. Stevens, Secretary: H.T. Calder, Treasurer: A.E. Selman, General Committee: F. Stevens, H. Monk, J. Chapman (Probably Charman), Crawford and T. Williams.**

12/9/1891 **OFTG** The **Annual Meeting** of the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB was held on Saturday 5th September at Mrs. Blair's Hotel. There was a good muster and the following were elected for the ensuing season. **Patrons: Shire Councillors, Mr. J. Keys MLA, Sir M.H. Davies MLA, Messrs H.P. Hayward, Selman, Bruce, Boyd, Willis, Hay and Stevenson. President: T.S. Grimwood, Vice Presidents: Messrs T. Jones, H.R. Moore, F.H. Lording, H.T. Calder, A. Lording, R. Hughes, A.E. Selman, J. Charman, W. Benson and E. Shearn. Captain: E. Blazey, Vice Captain: F. Stevens, Secretary: H.T. Calder, Treasurer: A.E. Selman, General Committee: F. Stevens, H. Monk, J. Chapman, Crawford and T. Williams.**

16/9/1891 **SBMJ** The **Annual General Meeting** of the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB was held on Saturday evening, 5th inst at Mrs. Blair's hotel. Report as above.

18/9/1891 **BHR** RINGWOOD will have a much better team than last year, considerable accessions to the club having been made from the vicinity of Ferntree Gully, in which place so many teams had their colours lowered last season.

30/9/1891 **DEXP** The DANDENONG CRICKET CLUB will play the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB in the 1891/92 season on December 5th, 1891 at Ferntree Gully and March 12th, 1892 at Dandenong. The first cricket match of the season was played on Mrs. Blair's ground on Saturday afternoon (26/9/1891) – MARRIED vs SINGLE. The former won the match by 68 runs. Good luck to the Benedict's.

1/10/1891 **DA** MARRIED vs SINGLE: As usual the youngsters of FERNTREE GULLY cannot hold their own with the MARRIED MEN winning by 68 runs – good luck to them.

1/10/1891 **HER** Lording, of the FERNTREE GULLY CLUB, HER and one of the North Melbourne footballers, will also join the first eleven this season, as well as two or three others.

7/10/1891 **DEXP** Ferntree Gully Crumbs: Cal-Der back again; Influenza had a grip on T.J. (Thomas Jones) and T.S.G. (Thomas Samuel Grimwood) – no fatal result! Cricket next Saturday (10/10/1891); FERNTREE GULLY vs RICHMOND 2nd XI, "Crawfish" will send them out to "Blazey's", and "Lock" them "Out".

9/10/1891 **HER** MELBOURNE v. UNIVERSITY (second elevens), on the Melbourne Ground. MELBOURNE also plays KEW COLLEGE, at Kew; FERNTREE GULLY, at Ferntree Gully; and a FITZROY eleven at the Wesley Ground.

9/10/1891 **NMA** *...the acquisitions are only three, but they will help do away with the 'tail' possessed last year. They are C. Armstrong and J.S. Drake of the Ormond, who are too well known to our readers to need any eulogy and E. Lording, called in football circles "farmer", who made over 1000 runs for his club last year, and had an average of 60.*

This suggests that Ted 'Farmer' Lording's season's summary (668 runs known) is about 350 runs shy of what his actual achievements was!

10/10/1891 **ARGUS** MELBOURNE CRICKET CLUB vs FERNTREE GULLY: At Ferntree Gully today

12/10/1891 **AGE** MELBOURNE v. FERNTREE GULLY — M.C.C., 81 (Moss 21, A. Philpot 17, Minogue 11, Champion 10); FERNTREE GULLY, six for 48 (Calder 23 not out). **Refer Scorebook.**

12/10/1891 **ARGUS** Short results of above match. **Refer Scorebook.**

13/10/1891 **SPMAN** MELBOURNE vs FERNTREE GULLY: Teams representing these clubs met on Saturday, at the close of the day the scores stood; MELBOURNE 81, FERNTREE GULLY 6/48. For MELBOURNE the principal scorers were Moss 21, A. Philpott 17, Minogue 11 and Champion 10, and for the GULLY, Calder with 23 not out, batted best. For MELBOURNE, G. Lavater captured 3/24 and H. Oakley 2/21. **Refer Scorebook.**

What with defections from their ranks and the prevailing epidemic, WILLIAMSTOWN were able to rake up eight men only to proceed to North Melbourne on Saturday. Three of the locals volunteered their services, however. This was necessary, as the home team's captain, Houston, won the toss from the veteran seaside, Grubb, and sent the visitors into the field; and there they remained until the stumps were drawn. H. Stuckey played a spirited innings for 67 (not out), hitting, as usual, well all round the wicket. This young batsman I also expect to see do big things this season. He is the right stamp of batsman— viz... One who has qualities both defensive and aggressive, and his heart is not ever round about the region of his mouth.

LORDING OF FERNTREE GULLY FAME played nicely for 28, and J. Carlton and Houston, when compiling their totals of 27 and 19, made things remarkably lively. Campbell, too, showed good form for 31. I am glad to see G. Bean has made an auspicious start, his 16 (not out) being the outcome of correct batting. As the NORTHERNERS total is already 229, with only half their wickets down, WILLIAMSTOWN appears to be in another street.

14/10/1891 **DEXP** CRICKET: MELBOURNE 2nd XI (XII) vs FERNTREE GULLY. MELBOURNE winning the toss went in first, making 81; the GULLYITES made 46 for 6 wickets. Poole bowled three for "ducks". Calder and Stevens were in when time was called. A match between the above was played on Saturday last (10/10/1891) on the Ferntree Gully Ground and resulted in a draw – **Refer Scorebook.**

15/10/1891 DA A match was played between FERNTREE GULLY and the MELBOURNE 2nd XI on Saturday last on the Ferntree Gully Ground, time preventing the conclusion of the game. Scores included Charman 2, E. Selman 6, H.T. Calder 26*, T. Williams 4, J.S. Crawford 3, M. McMahon 0, R. Crawford 2, F. Stevens 5*, Sundries 3 totalling 6/49 in reply to MELBOURNE 2nd XI 91. T. Poole 5 wickets, E. Selman 1 and F. Stevens 4 the Wicket Takers. **Refer Scorebook.**

16/10/1891 BHR FERNTREE GULLY vs MELBOURNE 2nd ELEVEN; On Saturday last (10/10/1891) the season started with a match against the MELBOURNE 2nd XI, who were lucky in getting the toss as well as the best of the light. Their innings resulted in a total of 81 runs, Moss (21), Philpott (17). FERNTREE Gully replied with 6 for 48 and Calder 23 not out.

The bowling honours for the GULLY were carried off by Poole (5 for 19) and Stevens (4 for 19) respectively. For MELBOURNE Laverter (3 for 21) and Oakley (2 for 21) bowled well. The GULLY team was weakened by the absence of E. Blazey, H. Monk and A.E. Selman. **Refer Scorebook.**

The GULLY meets RICHMOND SECOND XI on the ground of the former on Saturday (tomorrow) when a good game is anticipated. It is to be regretted that the GULLY team is weakened this season by the loss of such sterling cricketers as [E.E. Lording, the late hon. Secretary](#), he having left the district and having cast his lot with NORTH MELBOURNE. [Geo. Williams, last year's Captain](#), has followed his little brothers to MALVERN. Both these players leave the club with the best wishes of the whole team for their future success in the cricket field. The stonewaller of the past two seasons seems to prefer looking on this season to throwing his lot in with his fellow residents. **NOTE: As yet unsure of whom this refers to!**

17/10/1891 OFTG FERNTREE GULLY vs MELBOURNE 2nd XI: A match between these teams came off last Saturday (10/10/1891) at Ferntree Gully, the result being a draw 6/48 to 81 – **Refer Scorebook.**

17/10/1891 AUST MELBOURNE vs FERNTREE GULLY C.C. – the following were the scores in this match on Saturday (10/10/1891). M.C.C. 81 (Moss 21, A. Philpott 17, Minogue 11, Champion 10); FERNTREE GULLY six for 48 (Calder 23 not out) For M.C.C. G. Lavater secured three wickets for 24 and H. Oakley two for 21. **Refer Scorebook.**

17/10/1891 LEAD CRICKET GOSSIP – By Mid On; MELBOURNE against FERNTREE GULLY. M.C.C. 81 (Moss 21, A. Philpott 17, Minogue 11, Champion 10); FERNTREE GULLY, six for 48 (Calder 23 not out). **Refer Scorebook.**

17/10/1891 AUST On the North Melbourne ground, when the curator saw that rain was threatening, he took the precaution of covering the pitch with a tarpaulin, and so when North Melbourne won the toss and went in, they found the wicket in capital order for batting. To the excellent record of 220 for 6 wickets, H. Stuckey contributed 87 (not out) by first-class cricket, without a chance so far as I can gather. His off strokes were well made and resolute, and all round the wicket his play was artistic and telling. Stuckey, however, did not run well between wickets, and a similar remark applies to Campbell, who scored 31 in neat style. J. Carlton batted soundly for 87, which included a fine leg hit for 5 made off the first ball in the match. R. Houston, though he did not stop long, never shaped better in his life. His compilation of 19 was in every respect faultless.

Lording, who comes from the FERNTREE GULLY CLUB, showed promising form in totting up 28, and G. Bean merits mention for his 16 (not out). E. Bean was unable to play owing to an injured leg but he thinks he will be all right by the next round of pennant matches. I hope so. The WILLIAMSTOWN bowlers sent down some really good overs at times, especially Aughtie and Holten. Influenza caused three WILLIAMSTOWN men to be absent* and the North kindly lent three substitutes, one of whom, George Stuckey, acquitted himself in brilliant style, and once would have thrown his brother out but for the eagerness of the bowler, who knocked the bails off before the ball hit the wicket.

21/10/1891 DEXP Mr. Alfred Lording is again to the front in the matter of trophies. There is now on view in his window a very handsome electro plate ink stand and vase for flowers combined, which he has given for presentation to Mr. Harry Monk, for the best bowling average of last season.

FERNTREE GULLY vs RICHMOND 2nd XI: This match was played on the Ferntree Gully ground on Saturday last (17/10/1891) and resulted in a draw. One or two heavy showers during the afternoon hindered the game somewhat, which was nevertheless continued so long as there was light. Train arrangements are such that visitors do not arrive until 3 o'clock, and the consequence is that only a short time is available for play. F.J. Charman, H. Calder and S. Mortimer batted well for the GULLITES and F. Stevens took 4 out of the 5 wickets – **Refer Scorebook.**

22/10/1891 DA FERNTREE GULLY vs RICHMOND 2nd XI: Was played Saturday last on the Gully ground. As on the previous Saturday against MELBOURNE 2nd XI the train arrangements did not permit a conclusion to the game, which was further impacted by heavy showers during its progress. For the home team, J. Charman, H.T. Calder and S. Mortimer made good scores and F. Stevens took four of the five wickets to fall. The scores were J. Charman 38, S. Mortimer 14, H.T. Calder 20, Ed. Selman 2, F. Stevens 6, T. Poole 3, H. Monk 4, J.S. Crawford 0, T. Dobson 1, Ern Selman 0, R. Crawford 2*, Sundries 8; totalling 98. In RICHMOND's innings the scores were 5/58 with F. Stevens 4 Wickets and Ed. Selman 1. **Refer Scorebook.**

23/10/1891 BHR FERNTREE GULLY vs RICHMOND 2nd ELEVEN; Notwithstanding the unfavourable state of engagements and the laborious journey, RICHMOND 2nd ELEVEN ventured to Ferntree Gully on Saturday last to play the local team. The RICHMOND skipper won the toss and took the field. At the fall of the last wicket the GULLY had 98 to their credit, the principal scorers being Charman (38), Calder (26), and Mortimer (14). At the call of time the RICHMOND total stood at 58 for the loss of 5 wickets, the match thus ending in a draw. **Refer Scorebook.**

The following will represent FERNTREE GULLY in the match to be played against THOMAS WEBB & SONS, at Ferntree Gully to-morrow: Calder, Charman, J.S. Crawford, T. Dobson, Monk, Mortimer, Poole, Stevens, Selman (2), and T. Williams Emergencies - R. Crawford, Hughes, McMahon & Dinsdale.

The handsome trophy presented to the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB by Mr. A. Lording is now on view at his establishment. The trophy, which is it valuable one, consists of it silver-mounted inkstand epergne, and was won by Mr. J. Monk, for best bowling average during the past season. **NOTE: J. Monk should be H. (Henry) Monk with the 'J' in all likelihood a typographical error.**

28/10/1891 DEXP The cricket match between the FERNTREE GULLY Club and Messrs T. WEBB & Co.'s employees, arranged for Saturday last (24/10/1891) was deferred owing to several members of the latter club being attacked with the prevalent influenza. A scratch match was played instead.

29/10/1891 **DA** A match was arranged between FERNTREE GULLY and Messrs. T. WEBB & CO. on Saturday last, but in consequence of two or three members of the latter not appearing it had to be postponed and a scratch match was played instead.

4/11/1891 **DEXP** There is nothing of importance to record in the Gully during the last week. The weather has been wet and changeable, and the looked for descent of picnickers delayed. Saturday being Derby Day there was no shooting at the butts for Mr. Grimwood's Medal and no cricket match. As compensation however, there will be two on Tuesday next.

5/11/1891 **DA** Ferntree Gully has been more than usually quiet during the past week, the attraction of Derby Day causing the cricket match with LILYDALE to fall through and for the same reason there was no shooting at the Rifle Range for Mr. Grimwood's trophy.

6/11/1891 **BHR** The FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB plays a match against a team from PATTERSON, LAING & BRUCE at the Gully on Monday next. The FERNTREE GULLY 1st XI played a combined team of fifteen of the ST. ANDREWS & AVENUE clubs at the Gully on Cup Day. The GULLY went to the wickets and put together 110 of which G. Williams made 46 and E. Selman 51 not out.

The COMBINED TEAM then went to the wickets and made 158 of which Beggs contributed 91 and Johnson 17. Crawford bowled well for the GULLY, getting 4 wickets at a cost of 5 runs; Stevens also bowled well getting 4 for 17. Beggs trundled well for the COMBINED TEAM.

7/11/1891 **OFTG** The FTGCC plays a match against PATTERSON, LAING & BRUCE next Monday. The FTGCC 1st XI tried conclusions with a combined team of 15 of the ST. ANDREWS and the AVENUE CLUBS on the local Ground on Tuesday. FERNTREE GULLY went to the wicket first and totted up 110, the highest scorers being G. Williams 46, E. Selman 51*. Their opponents then made 158. Crawford and Stevens bowled well for the GULLYITES, the former getting 4/5, the latter 4/17. **Refer Scorebook.**

11/11/1891 **DEXP** Two matches had been arranged for Cup Day (3/11/1891) at Ferntree Gully against teams from St. ANDREW'S and THE AVENUE clubs, but with only a portion of each team turning up, ten of the FERNTREE GULLY men played a friendly game with 15 of the COMBINED CLUBS. For the home team Ed. Selman made a first class innings of 51 not out and G. Williams 46. For the visitors Begg was the only big scorer, his total amounting to 91 – **Refer Scorebook.** FERNTREE GULLY vs Eleven of Messrs PATTERSON, LAING & BRUCE's CC. This match was played on Monday, the 9th inst. but the report will appear with the Gully news of the same day in the next issue. **Refer Scorebook.**

12/11/1891 **DA** Cup Day was to have witnessed two matches at Ferntree Gully - two elevens of the home team doing battle with ST. ANDREWS and the AVENUE CLUBS, but the race for the cup having probably more attraction only part of each team put in an appearance.

As a consequence, a friendly game was played between 15 of the visitors and ten of the FERNTREE GULLY CLUB, the latter who also had several of their best men absent. Ed. Selman made a capital innings of 51* and George Williams made 46 while Begg for the visitors made a very sound 91. The bowling honours went to J.S. Crawford 4, Ed. Selman 3, G. Williams 2, R. Crawford 2 and F. Stevens 3 in the visitors 14/156 while with the Bat the GULLY men were G. Williams 46, H. Monk 0, Ed. Selman 51*, J.S. Crawford 0, A.E. Selman 3, R. Crawford 2, S. Mortimer 0, T. Dobson 2, M. McMahon 4 and F. Stevens 0 with Sundries 2 totalling 110. **Refer Scorebook.**

18/11/1891 **DEXP** Reports on a quantity of FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB news unavoidably held over, with a large report on the Rifle Club ball recorded. The enjoyment of a large number of excursionists to Ferntree Gully on Prince of Wales Birthday (9/11/1891) was completely marred by the heavy rain... The cricket match, which is usually esteemed here as the best of the season, was brought to a sudden close for the same reason

One of Rosenthal's cricket team, after several deep sinkers, joined the "rekobites"; got one from point. Hello, there cookie. Suffolk verdict – served him right. Alf says – Called her got a duck. Isn't it sickening? **NOTE: Henry Calder scored a duck in the match against Rosenthal Aronson & Co.**

19/11/1891 **DA** FERNTREE GULLY vs PATTERSON, LAING & BRUCE'S XI: Is a match always looked forward to and was started on the Gully ground on the 9th inst. but due to rain was not brought to a conclusion. As can be determined from the score six of the locals contributed manfully to a large total of 244 when compared to the visitors 80.

20/11/1891 **BHR** A cricket match was played at Ferntree Gully on Saturday last between the local team and a team from ROSENTHAL, ARONSON & Co. The GULLY went in first, and made 111, the visitors responding with 70 for 8 wickets. For the GULLY, E. Selman made 32, Blazey 22, R. Crawford 20 (Not out) and J.S. Crawford 10. Blazey and J.S. Crawford bowled well for the GULLY, the former getting 2 wickets for 7 and the latter 3 for 11. The FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB plays the SOUTH MELBOURNE RAMBLERS at the Gully tomorrow. The GULLY will be represented by Blazey, Calder, Charman, Crawford (2), Monk, E. Selman, Poole, Dobson, Williams and Stevens. **Refer Scorebook.**

21/11/1891 **OFTG** The FTGCC and PATTERSON, LAING & BRUCE Club met at the Gully on the 9/11/91 when the local men made 244 to the visitors 80. On last Saturday the GULLY men met the ROSENTHAL ARONSON COMPANIES XI but they were unable to bring it to a finish. The GULLY made 111 in their innings and ROSENTHAL were 7/72 when stumps were drawn. **Refer Scorebook.**

25/11/1891 **DEXP** FERNTREE GULLY vs PATTERSON, LAING & BRUCE'S XI: The match between the above teams was started on the Ferntree Gully ground on Monday, the 9th inst, but could not be played out in consequence of the rain. This match has now become a recognised annual affair on Prince of Wales Birthday and is always looked forward to as one of the most interesting of the

season, not only for the good display of cricket, but also from the pleasure derived from the society of a goodly number of guests, whose visits are always appreciated and enjoyed. **Refer Scorebook.**

Messrs PATTERSON, LAING & BRUCE's party made Mrs. Blair's their headquarters as usual, and left accompanied with parting cheers on both sides. On passing Mr. Grimwood's house he was also greeted with three times three.

26/11/1891 **DA** FERNTREE GULLY played against SOUTH MELBOURNE RAMBLERS on Saturday last at Ferntree Gully. The home team went in first and was not disposed of when time was called with the undoubted star being E. Blazey 131.

Scores were Ed. Selman 0, R. Crawford 58, H.T. Calder 22, J.S. Crawford 21, E. Blazey 131, F. Stevens 19, J. Charman 1*, H. Monk 0*, Sundries 13 totalling 6/265. The major contribution was the 4th wicket of 138 between R. Crawford and E. Blazey before Crawford was bowled. **Refer Scorebook.**

27/11/1891 **BHR** The cricket match between the GULLY and the SOUTH MELBOURNE RAMBLERS on Saturday last resulted in a draw. The **GULLY captain** won the toss and decided to wield the willow, which they did much to the chagrin of the RAMBLERS. At the call of time the GULLY had lost six wickets for 265, of which Blazey 131 and R. Crawford 58 were the principal scorers. The former gave a really splendid exhibition of hitting, his score including ten 4's and sixteen 3's. The only other batsmen to reach double figures were Calder 22, J.S. Crawford 21, and Stevens 19. The bowling of the visiting team was rather poor, but their fielding was good. During the afternoon rain came down which made the ball very greasy. **Refer Scorebook.**

2/12/1891 **DEXP** DANDENONG FIRST ELEVEN vs FERNTREE GULLY next Saturday (5/12/1891), at Ferntree Gully: Dowell, Renfree, R. Keys, W.G. Keys, Hobbs, Little, Evans, Williams, I. Keys, J. Keys & Purdy. The NARRE WARREN cricketers didn't turn up on Saturday (28/11/1891) and the locals played a scratch match amongst themselves. We are looking forward to the DANDENONG players coming over next Saturday, when a good display of cricket is anticipated.

2/12/1891 **SBMJ** The following is the team that will represent DANDENONG on Saturday next in the match between DANDENONG and FERNTREE GULLY at Ferntree Gully; The DANDENONG team will start from Mr. M. Evan's shop at 12:00 o'clock; Hobbs, Purdy, Little, R. Keys, W.G. Keys, Dowell, A. Evans, H. Renfree, I. Keys, J. Keys, J. Williams.

4/12/1891 **BHR** FERNTREE GULLY v DANDENONG; This match will be played at the Gully tomorrow (Saturday) afternoon. We regret to announce that the old veteran of the Gully, Mr. T.S. Grimwood is seriously ill. We trust that he will speedily recover and resume his usual place as "King of the Gully".

9/12/1891 **DEXP** Heavy rain on Saturday put an end to all idea of the cricket match with The DANDENONG XI. The visitors arrived in good time, but the state of the weather was such that they could not even go on the ground. Re the FERNTREE GULLY vs DANDENONG cricket match last Saturday, 'tis said the DANDENONG players went in and their opponents could not get them out – of Mrs. Blair's parlour. The originator of this base insinuation risked being "Locked up and Kaned" **NOTE: This is probably a reference to a person with the initials LK.**

9/12/1891 **SBMJ** The members of the DANDENONG CRICKET CLUB 1st XI visited the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB on Saturday last, to play a match with the GULLYITES. The heavy rain that fell precluded the possibility of playing cricket, but though the weather was too boisterous for out of door amusement the afternoon was passed at Mrs Blair's Hotel

10/12/1891 **DA** The DANDENONG Cricketers visited last Saturday and were unable to commence their match against FERNTREE GULLY due to the heavy rain, so the two teams amused themselves for a couple of hours at Mrs. Blair's hotel.

12/12/1891 **OFTG** The members of the DANDENONG CRICKET CLUB first eleven visited the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB on Saturday last to play their match. The heavy weather prevented play, but though the weather was too boisterous for out of door amusements, the afternoon was passed at Mrs. Blair's (FTG Hotel) in a social manner

16/12/1891 **DEXP** An interesting match was played on Thursday 10th inst on the Ferntree Gully Ground between the GULLY players and a team from the SOUTH MELBOURNE TRADES, thirteen on each side. The weather (for once) was all that could be desired, and some good play was witnessed, but time was called shortly after the visitors commenced batting. H. Calder's score of 45 included 5 threes, J. Charman's 43 6 threes, G. Williams 92 6 fours and 14 threes, and E. Blazey's 91 not out 10 fours and 7 threes. For the visitors Barrett made 43 not out including 6 fours and 1 three. The scores were GULLY 331, TRADES 2 wickets for 52 – **Refer Scorebook.**

The GULLY and TOORAK GROSVENOR clubs played a match on the Gully ground on Saturday last (12/12/1891), the home team winning by 19 runs and 7 wickets. 23/12/1891 **SBMJ** DANDENONG vs FERNTREE GULLY: This match was played at the local ground last Saturday and resulted in a loss to the extent of 142 runs, 33 to 175. FERNTREE GULLY went in for another innings and was 1/18 when the match concluded. **Refer Scorebook.**

24/12/1891 **BHR** Ferntree Gully News which came too late to hand for insertion into last week's issue...

SOUTH MELBOURNE v. FERNTREE GULLY: This match was played at Ferntree Gully on Thursday week last (10/12/1891) and resulted in a draw. FERNTREE GULLY won the toss and took the wickets and compiled the total of 331 runs before being disposed of. Calder (45), Charman (43), G. Williams (92) and E. Blazey (91 not out) did the lion's share of the scoring. 2/1/1892 **OFTG** On Boxing Day the FERNTREE GULLY team beat PARKHILL by 2 wickets and 10 runs.

8/1/1892 **BHR** The Cricket matches during the holidays have resulted in failures; only one team out of four turning up, the GULLY winning by 2 wickets and 10 runs against 15 opponents **NOTE: This was the PARKHILL CRICKET CLUB.**

9/1/1892 **ARGUS** MELBOURNE teams will play FERNTREE GULLY at Ferntree Gully today (Saturday)

11/1/1892 **ARGUS** Boyle & Scott's Cup results include CAPULET's vs MALVERN highlighting Oliver Williams' achievements.

MELBOURNE v. FERNTREE GULLY. This match was drawn in favour of the senior club, who made 197, the FERNTREE GULLY losing six wickets for 45. C.L. Green 40, G. Handfield 33, McNaughton 81, Thomas 21, A.P. Propsting 15, R. Propsting 18, and Lineker 10, were the chief scorers for MELBOURNE; and for the country club Blazey made 26 (not out). A.P. Williams 70*, E. Blazey 25, H.T. Calder 10, Sundries 4 totalling 122 whilst the bowling success was shared by F. Stevens 5, Ed. Selman 5 Wickets. **Refer Scorebook.**

FERNTREE GULLY also played a game against SOUTH MELBOURNE TRADES on 18th January which has just come to this paper's attention.

Mr H.T. Williams clung to his child, evidently determined to save it, and he did so at the sacrifice of his own life, for he was thrown out with the child still in his arms, and the dray then turned over, and the side of it fell with great force on to his head, fracturing the skull and killing him instantly.

Mr Williams's brother and the child escaped unhurt. The cart was righted, the remains placed in it and removed to deceased's residence, 55 Wright's Terrace, Prahran, from whence the funeral will move at eleven o'clock tomorrow morning. Deceased leaves a wife and two children and was only 27 years of age.

2/3/1892 **DEXP** FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB: Sir; "Megiddon", your enthusiastic correspondent, has, like a newly hatched chicken, suddenly broken his shell and began to crow (or cry).

Such a circumstance as that referred to by him in his evidently newly hatched condition, as well as its indisputable correctness, has not failed to convey the impression that his vindictive observation bears all the evidence of that of a "parvenu", not acquainted with the facts even if he were old enough to assimilate them, and therefore not in a position to discuss such, much less to make an unfounded public remark concerning them. His financial friend referred to had not the courtesy to accept his captain's invitation to take his post, and the captain was therefore necessitated to find someone else. 5/3/1892 PSTKC Sad death of **MR. H.T. WILLIAMS**, the well known MALVERN cricketer, on Monday (28/2/1892)

Fatal Accident at Malvern: A sad accident occurred on Monday afternoon in Malvern, by which **MR. H.T. WILLIAMS**, a well known resident and popular member of the MALVERN C.C. lost his life.

Mr. Williams was driving a drag drawn by two horses, tandem, having with him one of his children, when the wheel horse bolted, and the leader being drawn round, the dray upset, Mr. Williams falling underneath, and having his head crushed frightfully under the side of the dray, death being evidently instantaneous. Assistance was at hand and deceased was taken at once to his residence, No. 15 Wrights Terrace East Prahran.

If this is the way the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB expects to gain members, they are greatly mistaken, as no man like to see himself deliberately taken in.

9/3/1892 **WARWE** AN HEROIC ACT – A telegram from Melbourne states that on Monday afternoon last a **MR. H.T. WILLIAMS**, well known as a member of the cricketing fraternity, was killed when proceeding on a short holiday excursion along the Ferntree Gully Road. He was travelling in a drag with his child and brother, when the drag upset, and in a heroic attempt to save the child's life, which was successful, he sacrificed his own, being killed instantly. Both the child and brother escaped unhurt.

16/3/1892 **DEXP** The result of Saturday's cricket match between FERNTREE GULLY and DANDENONG shows the necessity of two clubs arranging for a two or three day match instead of a one day contest.

A draw is always an unsatisfactory termination to a match, and in this case only six wickets fell between the two clubs. FERNTREE GULLY vs DANDENONG: The above match was played on the Ferntree Gully ground on Saturday last (12/3/1892) and resulted in a draw.

A match between two such teams, as played on Saturday, should certainly commence play before two o'clock, unless the object is to make the match a draw, as happened on this occasion. DANDENONG won the toss and elected to send in the GULLY team, who would probably have remained at the wickets the whole afternoon, but about an hour before time, and with the score at 205 for 5 wickets they retired.

Messrs R. Keys and Hyde then went to the wickets, and very nearly succeeded in keeping their ground till the finish, but Hyde was caught about two minutes before time was called – **Refer Scorebook.**

16/3/1892 **SBMJ** The FERNTREE GULLY team played DANDENONG at their ground on Saturday last. The GULLY compiled 5/205 when they declared their innings closed and at the call of time DANDENONG were 1/58 in reply. **Refer Scorebook.**

17/3/1892 **DA** FERNTREE GULLY played DANDENONG last Saturday on the Ferntree Gully ground. When these two teams last met the rain fell incessantly such that the cricketers could not even make an appearance on the ground and on Saturday the weather was again somewhat doubtful with a biting cold morning. Fortunately, the weather improved, and spectators had the opportunity of witnessing a fine performance from the local team.

DANDENONG won the toss and sent their opponents in whom after running up 205 for the loss of 5 wickets retired leaving DANDENONG but one hour to bat, and time, was of course called before the match could be decided. It is a pity that matches of this ilk cannot be arranged to commence at an earlier hour instead of leading to the almost inevitable drawn result. **Refer Scorebook.**

18/3/1892 **BHR** FERNTREE GULLY v. DANDENONG: The return match between the above clubs was played on the ground of the former on Saturday last (12/3/1892) and resulted in a draw. The first match played at Dandenong was won easily by the home team.

The visitors won the toss and sent the home team in. A bad start was made but after the second wicket fell a prolonged stand was made and before the third wicket fell the score had mounted by 135 and 205 was reached for the loss of 5 wickets. They decided to close their innings; Williams 76, Lording 62, Blazey 39 not out and Crawford 15 not out were the principal scorers. At the call of time DANDENONG had lost 1 wicket for 58, of which Hyde made 33. **Refer Scorebook.**

A meeting of the committee of the cricket club was held last week, and amongst other matters the presentation of the trophies won last season was considered, the matter having been long delayed. It was decided that the trophies be presented to the successful members at a dinner promised to the club by Mrs. Blair, to be given at an early date.

23/3/1892 **DEXP** Annual Dinner in connection with FERNTREE CRICKET CLUB held at Mrs. Blair's yesterday evening (Tues 22/3). Large attendance, good spread, good liquors, speeches, songs, jokes, 'bon mots', general jollity and real good time. Write up on the return Rifle match between 'H Company' and the Ferntree Gully Rifle Contingent – Ferntree Gully won by 10 points

25/3/1892 **BHR** **FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB:** Distribution of Prizes: Last season the Annual dinner and distribution of prizes (1890/91) of the above club was unavoidably postponed, through circumstances over which the club had no control, but Mrs. Blair having promised to give the Club a dinner, it was decided to present the trophies of last season. On Tuesday evening a large number of Officers and Members of the Club, together with a number of visitors, assembled in a large marquee which had been assembled in the grounds attached to Mrs. Blair's well known hostelry. The tables were laden with all sorts of delicacies. After ample justice had been done to the good [obscured] provided, the chairman (Mr. Grimwood) proposed the usual loyal toasts, which were responded to with musical honours.

In proposing the toast of "The Hostess", Mr. Grimwood said that Mrs. Blair was always ready and willing to do anything for the comfort of the cricketers, as was evidenced by the sumptuous repast that was supplied by that lady that evening. He hoped that Mrs. Blair would be long spared to remain among them.

The President of the Shire (Cr. Kerr) responded on behalf of Mrs. Blair and said that anything she could do for the comfort and also to forward the interests of the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB she would be most happy to do it. The speaker then thanked them for the most enthusiastic manner in which the toast had been received.

"The President of the Club" was then proposed by Mr. Crawford in a very neat speech, in which he referred to the many things Mr. Grimwood had done to make the club what it was. That gentleman had the interests of cricket at heart and had done his best to forward the game. Mr. Grimwood, in responding, thanked them sincerely for the hearty manner in which they had drunk his health.

He had let them have the use of his land as a cricket field, and he could only say that as long as long as he owned that that land the club should have the use of it. He was sorry they were not so successful this year as last; still they would take a lot of beating. He could only hope that the club would continue to prosper and be as successful as it had been in the past.

The President of the Shire (Cr. Kerr) proposed "The Officers and Members of the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB, coupled with the name of the **Secretary (Mr. Calder).**" He was pleased to see so many young men taking part in cricket, as it was a very manly game. He well remembered one game he took part in some time ago, when he brought a team from Narre Warren to play the Gully team.

It was a broiling hot day and seven out of the eleven of his team found it too hot to exert themselves in the field; the consequence was they suffered defeat. He did not intend to bring another team over.

Since then the GULLY team had made wonderful progress, and now it took a very strong team to make a show against them. On behalf of the members of the Club, Mr. Calder responded, and thanked the company for the hearty manner in which they had drunk the toast. He had followed up the game for a good number of years and had tried to do his best to bring the GULLY club into the front rank of cricketers.

Although they had not had so many wins this season, the club had some splendid work. They had gone on different lines from last year. Instead of putting their opponents in first, they had taken possession of the wickets when possible, so that at the end of the season they would have a good record. Up to the present they had won 5, lost 3 and drawn 9. "Kindred Clubs" responded to by Messrs Maplestone (CARLTON C.C.) and Alexander (NORTH MELB. C.C.); "The Visitors", "The Ladies" and "The Press" brought the toast list to a close.

An adjournment was then made to the large room attached to the house, where music and harmony was indulged in to the very late hour. During the evening the trophy presented by Mr. A. Lording for the best bowling average was presented to Mr. H. Monk; that of Mr. R. Moore for best batting average to Mr. E.E. Lording; that of Mr. Jones for best attendance was presented to Mr. G. Williams and on behalf of the Club, Mr. Calder presented [Mr. Blazey \(Captain\)](#) with a bat.

30/3/1892 **DEXP** At the Annual Dinner of the FERNTREE GULLY CRICKET CLUB on Tuesday evening, 22nd inst, Mr. R.H. Kerr referred in feeling terms to the death of Mr. H. Williams, a prominent member of the club, by whose demise they had not only lost a respected member, but a sterling cricketer. Mr. Kerr's remarks were heartily endorsed by all present.

FTGFC - A meeting was held at Dobson's Hall on Thursday evening last (24/3/1892) for the purposes of forming a FOOTBALL CLUB in the Gully, and was well attended, but in consequence of the sale at Fern Park, there were many absentees who had signified their intention of joining the club. Mr. J. Henley, who presided, explained the object of the meeting, and the election of officers for the season resulted as follows – Mr. J.T. Dobson President, Mr. J. Dobson Jnr Treasurer, and Mr. George Trounsen Secretary. The election of a captain and committee was postponed until a full meeting of the club.

The Shire Councillors and the leading men of the district will be invited to act as Vice Presidents and patrons of the club. The racecourse paddock has been kindly offered to the club to play in by Mr. Ed. Selman and Mr. Alfred Lording will present a ball which he kindly promised last year.

There is no doubt now, but that the formation of a club worthy of the Gully may be looked upon as an accomplished fact. We are asked to state that the secretary will be glad to hear from other clubs to arrange dates for matches.
